## **AUTISM AWARENESS MONTH**

Nearly a quarter century ago, the Autism Society launched a nationwide effort to promote autism awareness, inclusion and self-determination for all, and assure that each person with ASD is provided the opportunity to achieve the highest possible quality of life. The Autism Awareness Puzzle Ribbon is the most recognized symbol of the autism community in the world. Autism prevalence is now one in every 68 children in America and one percent of the world's population.

Autism is known as a complex developmental disability. Experts believe that Autism presents itself during the first three years of a person's life. The condition is the result of a neurological disorder that has an effect on normal brain function, affecting development of the person's communication and social interaction skills. People with autism have issues with non-verbal communication, a wide range of social interactions, and activities that include an element of play and/or banter.

ASD stands for **Autism Spectrum Disorder** and can sometimes be referred to as **Autistic Spectrum Disorder**. A person with ASD will typically prefer to stick to a set of behaviors and will resist any major (and many minor) changes to daily activities. Autism (or ASD) is a wide-spectrum#lisorder. This means that no two people with autism will have exactly the same symptoms.
